

ADMISSIONS CRITERIA

For admission, applicants must present:

- An accredited Master's degree in International Relations, Regional Studies (European, Middle Eastern, American, Latin American, African, Asian), Politics, Political Science, Public Administration, History, Law, Economics) and other related areas;
- Proof of proficiency in the English language if the BA/BSc or MA/MSc degrees were not offered in English. If the proposed research is to be conducted in a language other than English, the candidate will have to provide evidence of sufficient proficiency in that language as well. Evidence of additional language skills will be considered an added advantage;
- A proposed dissertation topic which is within the supervisory competences of at least one faculty member;
- A statement of intent of 500-1000 words that includes an outline of the proposed dissertation topic and research area to be evaluated by the Department's Admissions Committee consisting of the Department Head and two other faculty members.

The Application Package must include:

- A completed PhD Application Form
 - Certified copies of the Degrees
 - Transcripts of previous academic work at the BA/BSc and MA/MSc levels
 - Two letters of recommendation written in English
 - Evidence of English proficiency (if the candidate's first language or the instruction of previous academic work was not in English), such as:
 - An IELTS minimum score of 5.5 or
 - A paper-based TOEFL minimum score of 550 or
 - An internet-based TOEFL minimum score of 80
- Applications may be submitted either for Fall or Spring Semesters.
 - Applicants may submit their MA thesis or any publications they may have.
 - Applicants who fulfill the minimum criteria will be invited for an interview.

AIMS AND OBJECTIVES OF THE PROGRAMME

The Department of European Studies and International Relations offers a PhD programme in International Relations. The programme aims at the creation and interpretation of knowledge which extends the forefront of the discipline of International Relations (in the wider reading of the discipline), through original research and critical thinking. Holders of a PhD in IR will be able to conceptualise, design and implement projects for the generation of significant new knowledge and/or understanding in the field of International Relations. Furthermore, holders of a PhD in IR will have the qualities needed for employment that requires the ability to make informed judgments on complex issues in specialist topics of IR, and innovation in tackling and solving conceptual and practical problems in world politics. The Department recognises and incorporates a range of contemporary approaches to the acquisition of knowledge in International Relations and guides students to choose these lines of inquiry most suitable to successful careers.

The programme is designed to prepare students for a wide variety of careers in college and university teaching, research, public service, and the private sector. Students who successfully complete the programme will:

- gain a deep knowledge of the most advanced aspects of modern international relations;
- acquire the latest specialised skills and techniques, including synthesis and evaluation, required to solve critical problems in research and/or innovation and to extend and redefine existing knowledge and/or professional practice in the field of international relations;
- develop competence in identifying and evaluating numerous forms of evidence on public events in world politics;
- gain an understanding of the complex theories of international relations, as well as the actors and institutions involved. Students will also have the means of evaluating their preferences and outcomes;
- acquire greater skills in written and oral communication in English.



PROGRAMME PROFILE AND REQUIREMENTS FOR COMPLETION

The Ph.D. degree requires the completion of 180 ECTS out of which 60 ECTS are for the research proposal and the remaining 120 ECTS are for the writing of the Dissertation.

WHO CAN APPLY TO THE PROGRAMME?

The Department of European Studies and International Relations welcomes applications to the Ph.D. programme in International Relations from holders of a Master's degree in International Relations, Regional Studies (European, Middle Eastern, American, Latin American, African, Asian), Politics, Political Science, History, Law, Economics and other related areas who fulfill the minimum criteria of admission.

DURATION OF STUDY

The PhD in International Relations is a minimum of three academic years, although candidates can take up to a maximum of eight academic years to complete their studies.

LANGUAGE OF INSTRUCTION

Ph.D. candidates may write their dissertation either in English or in Greek.
